

Meta will inevitably run into the types of content moderation issues it has faced in the past.


Conservatives are already criticizing the app for warning users about accounts that have posted false information, and sex workers say they are far more sidelined by Meta than Twitter.

Zoom out

Twitter is threatening legal action over Threads, alleging misappropriation of Twitter trade secrets amid the hiring of dozens of Twitter employees.

While other Twitter competitors — like Mastodon and Bluesky — have tried to replace Twitter, none have grown as quickly as Threads did in just one day.

Why it matters

Nearly 80% of people have location sharing activated on their phones some of the time, and 16% have it activated all of the time.

Location sharing can change a social dynamic — when someone shares their location, the recipient will share theirs back.

Some scholars view location sharing among teens as a show of affection and digital intimacy, calling it "a form of compassion."

What it's like to get laid off while on parental leave

The big picture

Tech companies have been trying to recruit more women to increase diversity — and one way they've done that is by offering more generous paid leave benefits.

But these efforts had a dark side in this round of layoffs, with tech workers losing their jobs while out on parental leave.

What they're saying

"It was like a gut punch," said a former Meta worker laid off while on leave, along with her boss — who was also pregnant.

She's struggling with juggling a job search with a new baby at home. "I have to make crazy arrangements to try to do interviews right now," she said.

Reality check

- While it feels wrong, it's not illegal to fire a pregnant person or someone who's out on parental leave.
- But, it is illegal to fire someone because they're pregnant or just had a baby.

5,600 Philadelphians voted. The winner? A 3-lane version of Washington Avenue.

What's the current plan?

- Next month, repaving will start on the entirety of Washington Avenue.
- West of Broad Street: Washington Avenue will only be repaved.
- East of Broad Street: Washington Avenue will get a "mix-lane" layout with traffic calming features, like loading zones

Wait ... why isn't the whole avenue changing?

Because politics, of course.

Washington Avenue runs through two Philly City Council districts: District 1 and District 2.

District 1 Councilmember Mark Squilla introduced legislation for the mix-lane layout. District 2's Kenyatta johnson declined to push similar legislation.

So, why don't we have a 3-lane Washington Avenue?

The first time around, OTIS cited the pandemic, scrapping the initial plan in February 2022.

Why? Grays Ferry and Point Breeze residents said they felt left out of initial surveys, and feared changes would speed up gentrification.

More surveying commenced. The verdict? Some areas would have 3 lanes of traffic and others would have 5.

Okay, but not all of Washington Avenues is like that...

That's because this mixed-lane scenario would require City Council to pass bills to update parking and loading rules.

Councilmember Squilla did this — but only for his district, thanks to councilmatic perogative.

Councilmember Johnson refused to do the same, so the only immediate improvement to the west side of Washington Avenue will be smoother streets.
